The Beginning of Little League

Carl's neighbors thought so, too. They raised \$35 to start three teams. They got stores to donate uniforms. Carl called it the Little League.

Little League Then and Now

The very first Little League game was played on June 6, 1939. The Lundy Lumber team played against the Lycoming Dairy team. Lundy Lumber won.

Today, Little League teams play in every state. They play in 80 countries, too. Little League is the biggest organized sports program in the world.


