

At last the trial began. A jury would decide if John Peter Zenger was guilty. Did he tell lies that hurt the governor? If he did, the jury would have to say he was guilty.


The jury heard the governor's side of the story first. They heard about Zenger's newspaper stories. They were told that no one had the right to print bad things about the governor.
